MEDIA & PASTORAL COMMUNICATION TO WOMEN LEADERS



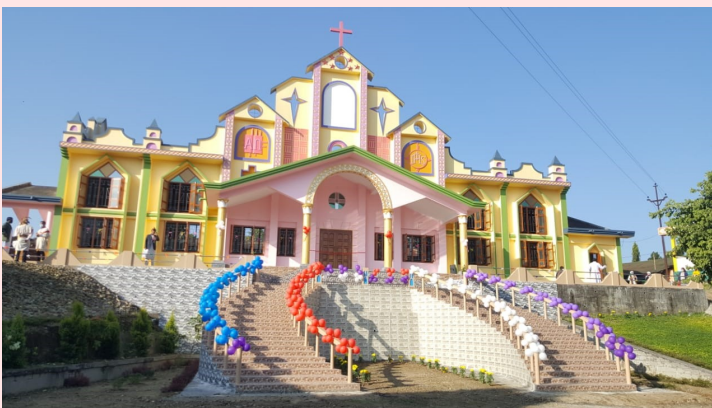
Kachuchara (Tripura) 29, November 2020:

iving in this time of uncertainties has taught us various important lessons. While none of us have experienced the specific details of the challenges before us, we are not without resources to help see us through. It is time for everyone to share that path breaking lessons with people and leaders around the world and that might contribute towards enhancing their leadership knowledge, wisdom, and viewpoint to inform and inspire many more so that life will move on even amidst real challenges and seeming impossibilities.

It is a fact that to survive this pandemic, the entire planet must reformulate its way of operating. We certainly require enormous cooperation between individuals, societies,

and countries; otherwise everything will remain the same, with populist and irresponsible leadership exacerbating nationalist feelings over the planetary common good. Not only that a shared future is better than a lonely one. It's better to realize sooner that there is no future if it is not shared. The current pandemic has placed the whole world at a standstill with nations going into lockdown to stall the virus's relentless march. Still, there is no specific data on when situations will stabilize. What is certain is that the people are learning valuable lessons through this global crisis, and life after COVID is sure to change for the better.

As Pope Francis rightly observes, as members of one human family and residents of our only common home, a dangerous selfishness infects many more of us than Covid-19. "We have failed in our responsibility to be guardians and stewards of the earth. We need only take a frank look at the facts to see that our common home is falling into serious disrepair. We have polluted it, we have despoiled it, endangering our very lives.... We have no future if we destroy the vey environment that sustains us" (Cfr. 2020:14).

Most of the people in the world are aware that pandemic of this sort is an invitation for us to read the signs that Covid-19 has unequivocally displayed. We may never forget that how loss of human contact during this time

profoundly impoverished us when separated from family members, neighbours, friends, co-workers, including the utter cruelty of being unable to accompany the dying in their last moments and then mourn them properly. It is an invitation for us not to take togetherness and companionship of our beloved ones for granted in the future too, but we shall try to rediscover it and strengthen it more than ever.

Now, while we are looking forward to a slow and arduous recovery from the pandemic, there is a danger that we will forget those who are left behind. The risk is that we may then be struck by an even worse virus, that of selfish indifference. A virus spread by the thought that life is better if it is better for me, and that everything will be fine if it is fine for me. The present pandemic, however, reminds us that there are no differences or borders between those who suffer. We are all frail, all equal, and all precious. Today, we need to take even the smallest along with us. It is not enough to see that only a small part of the human family moved ahead with ease, while others suffer in agony and pain.

Living with Covid 19: Some deep rooted changes

No government since 1947 can truthfully claim that it has succeeded in

liberating every Indian from poverty and ignorance, and disease and inequality of opportunity (Mukerjee, 2020). Living with the Covid-19 disaster has activated deep rooted changes in the structure of the economy which may outlast the crisis, feels Dr. Abhirup Sarkar (2020). Sarkar continues saying ‘the Indian economy was in a phase of slow-down when Covid-19 hit the country’. Now we need to launch a collective resolve to re-imagine a more sustainable and resilient human fraternity taking some major components of the society as quickly as possible. In the case of Covid-19, probabilistic thinking and decision making are made even more difficult by the shortage of good data on how the virus is transmitted and the most effective treatment strategies, plus there are political and time pressures (Dipanjon Konwar, 2020). For students, school life is absurdly incomplete without the action packed day of running in the corridors, hurling things around in class and being punished by angry teachers (Vandana Vasudevan, 2020). The head of the UN food agency has warned, “As the world is dealing with the coronavirus pandemic, it is on the brink of a hunger pandemic that could lead to multiple famines of biblical proportions.” The UN World Food Programme has warned that an estimated 265 million people could face acute food security by the end of

2020 (Banasmita Baruah, 2020). In the future, we will find a return to normalcy in many aspects of life. But there is no question that many things will change, possibly forever. Covid-19 has altered the experience of being a customer, an employee, a citizen, and a human. One can expect to see behavior shifts for some time to come (Tarun Ch. Bordoloi, 2020).

Let us welcome this time of trial as an opportunity to prepare for our collective future, a future for all without discarding anyone. Because, without an all-embracing vision, there will be no future for anyone. We need to tell the stories of hope to many more people while living in solidarity with one another. We have a shared future if we do not destroy the very environment that sustains us. The virus has altered our lifestyle in many ways. Today, when we realize that the virus in all probability is going to stay for a long while as virologists caution us, the life must go on. As it is in human nature that we learn day by day to evolve and adapt to changing situations, we need to gain that resilience and openness to look out for various options to live, work and worship among other areas of involvement.

In the months ahead, as the virus waxes and wanes in different areas, the need will be to enhance capacity and augment resources with more

determination and better coordination. For example, are we as a nation ready and prepared to manufacture the life saving vaccine for this pandemic and drawing out mechanisms to distribute it methodologically? The National Expert Group on Vaccine Administration for Covid-19 is working on these issues of manufacturing capacity, delivery mechanism, digital inventories and the strategic order in which the population will be vaccinated. It is important to put a very detailed plan in place and maximize the benefits of the vaccine rather than encounter chaos when at last the vaccine arrives (Times of India, Sept. 17, 2020).

Living with Covid-19 is an invitation for all of us to adopt the best practices of any parts of the world to make every day living meaningful and sustainable. We are invited to embark on a striking and wondrous balance between efficiency, market economics and equality of opportunity while caring for the health of everyone. We need to reinvent ourselves in mutual understanding and building on the good will of one and all. No one can deny that suddenly, the virus had made its home in the body of lakhs of people in different countries around the world. The coronavirus that started in the city of Wuhan, China, on December 31, 2019, managed to travel across the length and breadth of the world, ignoring borders, cul-

tural differences, climatic zones and many other differences between peoples and nations.

Set Priorities for COVID-19 Research
This outbreak of unimaginable proportions brought many stakeholders together, especially the leading health experts from around the world who have been meeting at the World Health Organization's Geneva headquarters at regular intervals to assess the current level of knowledge about the new COVID-19 disease, identify gaps and work together to accelerate and fund priority research needed to help stop this outbreak and prepare for any future outbreaks.

Many scientists have in uncertain terms reiterated that this outbreak of Covid-19 which turned into a pandemic with unprecedented speed was a test of solidarity - political, financial and scientific. They have realized that there is an immediate need to come together to fight a common enemy that does not respect borders, ensure that we have the resources necessary to bring this outbreak to an end by drawing up concrete plans and commitment to work with many likeminded agencies - a multi-pronged attack of the problem. Today we are aware that some of the most exciting and most promising vaccines are on the way to success after

rigorous research and they are approaching our grasp soon!

The coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic is having a profound effect on all aspects of society, including mental health and physical health. There is an important need to explore the psychological, social, and neuroscientific effects of COVID-19 and set out the immediate priorities and longer-term strategies for mental health science research. Many countries have launched these and other important tasks as vital priorities and have launched sample surveys of the public and assigned expert panels comprising of health experts of the country and scientific research teams. What about us in India? We need to heed to recommit on our determination for undertaking vital researches on health. This invitation to our collective future can only be denied at our own peril!

Salient Changes for the Better

This pandemic made people learn to live with the bare essentials during the lockdown. Healthy home-cooked meals replaced junk food. It made families work together to protect all members from harm. Every member is assisting in household chores, along with caring for the children and the elderly, developing stronger

bonds. Post-lockdown as well, the virus will take time to be completely eradicated, making social distancing and other measures a part of the long-term future. The pandemic stressed the need to prepare the healthcare system for handling rapid surges in the volumes of patients. Steps are underway for creating adequate capacity in hospitals to cope with emergencies better. Wearing masks, using hand-sanitizers, and maintaining physical distances are going to be the new normal.

As people work together in breaking the chain of coronavirus infection, a better world is emerging. This is the lesson that we must take into the post-Covid-19 world: The time has come to mobilize this goodness in our midst, rather than drive it to the sidelines through institutions and incentive systems that reward selfishness and predatory competitiveness. The tough times are sure to pass, leaving behind the wisdom of practicing compassion and caring for what genuinely matters in life, like the welfare of family members. The time has come to re-evaluate the appropriate goal of business; the goal of our economic activities; the goal of our ideologies and social conventions; and the goal of our local, national and international governance structures. The pandemic shows us that the goals of all these domains must always be the

same: contributing to the fulfillment of human needs and purposes. This requires us to cooperate locally, nationally, and globally when we face challenges of various intensities.

Therefore, life after the pandemic should be appreciated by one and all because the times gone by have taught us better lessons of love than hate. It has opened our eyes to the need for food for sustenance, not luxury. It has taught us that disease knows no geographic, ethnic, caste, and religious boundaries. Our hand wash, masks, social distancing and other daily commitment to protecting oneself and others surely is an invitation to a collective future. May our efforts to learn lessons in caring for oneself, others, and humanity including our mother Earth be crowned with.
