I believe it is this attitude of doing everything with passion, doing things with one's soul, creativity and love that ushers in contentment, fosters growth and nurtures faithfulness in one's life resulting in a commitment to serve others and the wounded world as a faithful and creative disciple.

Therefore, as we move on with our life and mission in this academic year and initiate the process of preparation for the 19th General Chapter, we will do well to reflect on, what it means to be a meraki person, what it means to desire to live a life of abundance and a more impactful life. In Greece, someone who loves life, lives it to the full, does everything with enthusiasm and passion, is often, referred to as a 'Meraklis'. Every single thing we do, day in and day out, if it is done with 'meraki' it can work miracles in our life and in the lives of others and whole of God's creation, and how I wish, that all of us - persons called and sent by God on a mission, were 'meraklis' – persons of passion, optimism and creativity in a wounded world of today.

Most of us live and organize our life on the accustomed models of fear rather than risk, limitations rather than strengths, convention rather than innovation, convenience rather than conviction and competition

rather than celebration. But imagine the possibilities, if we could live and function by our strengths, convictions and innovative spirit. Imagine the possibilities, if we could embark on a quest to find our passions and fuel our interests and ignite our hope to dream big and be joyful, faithful and successful. Imagine the possibilities, if our communities were places that persistently generated the inspiring artists, musicians, singers, poets, writers, preachers, pastors, activists with ample opportunities for innovation within the scope of our missionary charism. Imagine the possibilities, if we could give the beginners the opportunities to explore their passions and interests using a mission driven yet a personalized learning approach that honoured choice and autonomy. Imagine the possibilities, if innovative programmes and interests based on initiatives were the norm in our communities and the Society. And imagine the possibilities, if we could wholeheartedly support all our dialogue partners in mission in finding and living their own spirit of meraki. The possibilities would be immense and the end result would be incredible! We would be much happier, others much more productive and the wounded world much more wholesome – a better place for you and for me.



Our 19th General Chapter theme: "Your Light Must Shine Before Others (Mt. 5: 16) – Faithful and Creative Disciples in a Wounded World" urges us to recognize that we are the light of the world, and sent by the Light, we are to be the light to the world by standing for the truth, building communities, instilling hope, offering warmth of relationship and healing the wounds of hatred, violence, division and injustice with a spirit of meraki. Let's

therefore, be meraklis, and in this way, we can make the first and the greatest commandment of our Lord real for ourselves and impactful for others, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' (Mt. 22: 37-39).

CELEBRATING 75 GLORIOUS YEARS ST. THERESA'S CHURCH, BANDRA



June 26, 2022 was a memorable day in the history of St. Theresa's Parish, when the parishioners and the clergy team came together to celebrate 75 glorious years of the parish. Most Rev. Leo Cornelio SVD, Emeritus Archbishop of Bhopal presided over the solemn thanksgiving Eucharist at 10.00 a.m, where Fr. Richard Mathias, our Provincial Superior and a number of other priests concelebrated the Mass. The Hindi community led the celebrants to the altar with an entrance dance. To mark this important milestone in the parish, the VISION team, namely the parish bulletin editorial team, brought out a commemorative book highlighting the history and development of the parish from its inception in 1946 to the present time. Rt. Rev. John Rodrigues, the Auxiliary Bishop of the archdiocese of Mumbai released the book. The presence of three former Parish Priests,

namely Frs. Salvador Serrao, Berly Pallan and Jolly Kuriakose added joy to the celebration. After the liturgical celebration, while the priests and the religious joined the parish community for a fellowship meal, the parishioners entertained themselves via fun-day games in the school quadrangle. In the evening, over 375 parishioners gathered in the school hall for a fun-filled evening and fellowship meal. The Hindi community too joined the get-together in large numbers. After a gap of almost three years, the parishioners used this occasion to come together and have fun and fellowship.



St. Theresa's parish, which took birth in a small woodhouse chapel with Fr. Theophilus Gomes, a diocesan, as its first Parish Priest gradually grew and expanded from the time it was handed over to the SVDs in 1948. Today, this parish is vibrant with various cells and associations, proudly ministering to over 800 families under the present clergy team Frs. Henry D'Souza, Antony Puthumana, Nicolau D'Costa and Felix

Arul. Having adopted the Mangaon mission, St. Theresa's parish reaches out to the basic needs of the poor people in this mission.

FROM SCRAP PICKER TO SCHOOL TOPPER A SUCCESS STORY OF SSS, PUNE

At mid-day, under scorching heat, a 6-year-old boy and his elder brother were forced to painstakingly collect scrapped bottles from railway tracks at Pune railway station as the only means of earning some money for food and for taking care of his younger siblings. Dinesh Shinde (Name Changed) was forced to do this work as long as he lived with his parents. Being forced to work, he never got the chance to get any education as all his time withered away in collecting and selling discarded water bottles. At such a tender age, he had already experienced many hardships. In 2009, the social workers of Sarva Seva Sangh, Pune, first came in contact with Dinesh when he was only 4 years old and they tried to reach out to his parents and educate them on the importance of formal education and how that could change their life. After continuous motivation, counselling and persuasion, his mother reluctantly agreed; but her deep concern was of losing the earnings he brought by picking up scrape from the railway tracks and from inside the trains along with his elder brother, who travelled every day from their little hut at Ghorpadi to Pune station to start their routine of scrap collection.

In the year 2012, when Dinesh was enrolled in standard one, initially, though a year and a half older than his classmates, he was the last in his class, with no formal education like others. Besides no education, the set pattern of his new environment in Sarva Seva Sangh was entirely opposed to his free way of life at the railway station; hence, it was an ordeal for him to adjust to it. Further, after a year he was enrolled in the school, both his parents died leaving two younger siblings, apart from his elder brother who too was a minor at that time. Gradually he turned out to be an all-rounder, who excelled in sports, art and craft, and with a beautiful handwriting which was admired by all his teachers. He also became very disciplined, respectful, responsible and punctual. He too developed a lot of interest in reading books and newspapers and worked hard on improving English language skill.

Once he overcame the initial hurdles, there was no looking back. With regular schooling and with his efforts and never ending determination, he topped in his school with a distinction in class ten. It is an added joy to him that his younger sister too passed class ten with him securing 70 per cent marks. This year, four children from street situations including Dinesh passed class ten with high grade who were under the care of Sarva Seva Sangh, a charitable Trust in Pune, an initiative of the Society of the Divine Word, India Mumbai Province. And this is the second year in a row, boys from street situations, cared by Sarva Seva Sangh, have become school toppers in class ten.

ISHVANI KENDRA ORGANIZES OMO

At the beginning of the new academic year, Ishvani Kendra opened its door to 37 young and energetic missionaries preparing to go to overseas missions. They came from ten different states of India and belonged to eleven religious congregations. There were nine SVD priests, two Montfort brothers and 26

religious sisters. These 37 missionaries are already assigned to 27 different countries in all the six continents and will go to their missions as soon as possible. The enthusiastic missionaries were oriented with inputs on cultural and psychological transition; intercultural communication; Indian faith traditions; safeguarding the vulnerable and preventing sexual abuses; challenges of mission life; new religious



movements; Church teachings especially on the direction of the Church with Pope Francis; and Biblical missionary discipleship. Sharing of experiences and insights by missionaries serving in other countries was also an important aspect of the course. This year ten missionary sisters and priests of Indian origin from seven different countries joined the participants live on ZOOM to share their experiences and challenges. Three other SVDs on holidays in India also came

in person to share and to inspire the aspiring ones. On a different level, Sr. Edita Maria Ulman SSpS, a student in Bangalore from Ukraine was also on hand to share her experiences of India and the agony faced by the people of war-torn Ukraine. Each participant also made a research presentation on their mission destination. Our efforts were to orient the participants to send their hearts first to their new mission, people, and lands even before they get ready with their luggage. The Overseas Mission Orientation (OMO) course is Ishvani Kendra's unique contribution to the Church in India to prepare its missionaries getting ready to serve in missions abroad. We are indeed happy and privileged to be of service in the humble efforts of the Indian Church to be part of the worldwide mission entrusted to us by Jesus to "make disciples of all nations" (Matt 28:19).
